TICKS

The south-west is one of the areas of the UK where ticks are most common, and according to recent press reports, their numbers are on the increase. Dogs and cats can pick them up from brushing through long grass, in fields or on the common. They attach firmly to the skin and suck blood, growing in size to become as large as a thumbnail after they have fed. Their appearance can be reddish brown or grey, and on close examination you can sometimes make out a small shell on the back. Ticks cause irritation and skin infection where they attach, but more seriously, they also carry Lyme's disease. Ticks should be removed as soon as possible, but not just by pulling as this will often leave the mouth parts embedded in the skin. Various special tick hooks or tick removers are available from your vets or pet shop. To prevent ticks from attaching in the first place, talk to your vets about preventative spot-ons. Not all flea treatments will prevent ticks as well, so do take advice.
